#### Growing Up And Moving On

Most people without disability move a total of **eight** times in a lifetime.

Between the ages of 18 and 30, people will generally move the most, probably three or four times.

Disability in what? Activities of daily living.




#### Activities of Daily Living

Wheelchair accessible homes, should not focus on the wheelchair, but rather focus on the person sitting in it.







Who has the needs in the family?


ie .e Our accommodation needs should include consideration of our roles in life-

Spouse, Parent, Uncle, Sibling, Foster parent, Friend, Daughter etc.

These roles change as we move through life.









Use of Space around the home and garden





Our Occupational Role (our professional identity and responsibilities) and Occupational Narrative (our life story, culture and life experience)





#### Accommodation needs

The impairments and the aids used to overcome the disability.

#### Disability in what?

- Activities of daily living.
- Preforming our roles in life.
- Occupational identity.

Doing so whilst considering the Occupational narrative.



## Are we adapting for the wheelchair or the user?



Alex is paraplegic, he sustained a complete spinal cord injury at T5-T7 whilst working as a fire fighter.

Alex's accident at work took place three years ago.

Alex was married and had 4 children under the age of 10.

Alex was a very hands-on dad, he loved spending time with his children.

The family home was not wheelchair accessible. Alex was moved to a rental wheelchair accessible home.





## Alex's accommodation needs



#### Adapting for the wheelchair will include -

- 1. Level access and threshold free ground floor.
- 2. Wet-floor shower area
- 3. Access to a bedroom
- 4. Accessible kitchen
- 5. Access to communal rooms
- 6. Accessible patio
- 7. Hard standing for a wheelchair accessible WAV

## Alex's accommodation needs



#### What is missing?

#### The user and everything that is important to him

- a. Alex' roles in life husband, father, son, sibling, uncle and friend.
- b. Alex's occupational role- firefighter, craftsman, DIY expert, a football coach.
- c. Alex's occupational narrative— Alex is the glue that holds people together, both with his extended family and his colleges, he also leads the under-12 football group in his village.

How do we meet the user's accommodation needs? Are these permanent, long-term needs?

### What is a forever home?

Most people move a total of 8 times in a lifetime.

Can we assume that one property will meet someone's lifetime of changed circumstances and needs?







# Jack's accommodation needs-long term

Jack is 11yrs, he has cerebral palsy and mild – moderate learning difficulties. He lives with his mother, stepdad and his three siblings (13yrs, 4yrs and 2yrs) in rented accommodation.

The family has no support system around and they are struggling to find a suitable support worker to live with them in this property due to the lack of privacy.

Jack uses a wheelchair when he has a bad day but prefers to walk whenever possible.



# Jack's accommodation needs-long term

What are Jack's long term accommodation needs?

This confirmed by the experts -

Likely to become a wheelchair user as he gets older. He will always require support with his personal care, but what else?

What are Jack's occupational roles?


What is Jack's occupational narrative?

When the client is a child, there is an additional need to consider the immediate family, how do we do that?











#### Integration Of Care Into A Home Setting
